Why Pre-Planning is Important

A week ago in my church, we had to donate money to ensure a member was buried properly. The bereaved family did not have a funeral policy.

There are many insurance companies and trust companies who offer policies that are affordable to you and your family. The family in my church could have discussed these options

with relatives because they knew their member was terminally ill.

After death, the family had to pass the hat around at local businesses and churches. Collections were taken at the church. It was really a sad site to watch. Can you imagine how the family felt during the worst day of their lives?

Many of us can learn from this. Planning a funeral is an emotional and stressful time, without having to worry about finances. Planning ahead and having the right funeral cover should be carefully considered, especially if you think of the financial burden that this can place on the family. You need a policy that will suit your budget. A policy that will deliver the benefits as required and is offered by a company that will support you during this difficult time.

A comprehensive funeral plan will give a family the opportunity to celebrate the life of the loved one. People will not be forced to plan a funeral quickly, will not feel vulnerable and hurried into quick, hasty decisions. We have given you a way to plan your final wishes online at your pace with the support of your agents and us- we will make sure you have your legacy in place.

Handy tips:

- Determine if the deceased has specific requests or a funeral plan in place. Observe the wishes of the deceased and incorporate them into the funeral planning.
- If you pre-plan your own funeral, you have the final word on what you would like and how you would like it done.
- It is also one of the most loving gifts that you can give your family because they want to know what type of funeral or memorial service you want.
- If you have a terminal illness or are injured severely, instead of funeral arrangements and final affairs, you can focus on family, friends, religion, spirituality, etc.

e-Plot

What is an e-Plot? We compare it to your own personal online Presidential Library. Imagine going to Marion, Ohio and touring President Warren G. Harding's home. Walking through the front door and seeing where they would congregate to listen to the radio or read the daily news paper. Walk around the corner to the kitchen and see the place settings or even the table they ate off. You could wander upstairs and see where he would sleep at night. Imagine going down the street to his memorial and walking up to the massively tall white marbled pillars, peeking through the gate at what now lies President Warren G. Harding and his beloved wife, Florence Harding and the trees sent over by Japan as a token of love. You could walk down the sidewalk and read about him on this custom marble made memorial showing his legacy growing up and owning a newspaper in the small town of Marion, Ohio. You see, just because we are not all presidents- doesn't mean we don't have a story to leave or a legacy to leave behind. In fact, some of us have just as big of

stories to tell, legacies to live on, and pass on to others. How about Dakota Meyer, the Medal of Honor recipient for his actions during the Battle of Ganjgal on September 8, 2009, in Kunar Province, Afghanistan. What a story that would be to actually read or see 50 years from now. You walk up to Dakota's grave mark - type in his e-Plot ID and you'll see his service record, his awards, his Medal of Honor Citation, and who he was afterwards. How about Sarah Palin, the former Governor of Alaska? She wasn't a president but I am sure people would like to know her story as they walk up to her burial plot in Alaska 50 years from now. Why did she leave office to pursue a career in the American Media and give up that power as an elected governor? We all have a story to tell. Period!

Have you ever gone to a grave site and seen a marker or monument and wonder exactly who it belonged to or even what their story was? Maybe you are at a Marine's grave and you wanted to know where he served or what he looked like. Maybe you are at music singers site and you wanted to hear their music. With today's technology you can. We offer you the ability to purchase your e-Plot before you or your family die- and leave your legacy in stone.

How it works.

Step 1-Pick Plan

Step 2- Design Your E-PLOT Online- We've made it very easy!

Step 3- When someone goes to your Marker they will see your domain name- or E-Plot

Ex. EPLOT/4965 They type it in and your information pops up. Now your legacy lives forever. - They type that in their phone- and your E - Plot will show up.

Leave your E-Plot Code in your will or letter to your family and they can go their and find a note you left them - and your last gift of love. We will keep your legacy online forever. 100 years from now- someone can go to your grave site- see your E-Plot and know exactly who you are and what you did--- leave them a message too

We have FOREVER - CARDS you can hand out at the funeral or leave on on your grave. Have them personalized with a message to a loved on. Leave one to each Child- Your Wife- A Friend!

Someone could go to your E- Plot and find your grave site as well. For example- you have family who are out of town.

They want to visit your grave a few years later- they can go to your E-Plot click on the map and it'll get them to your site or cemetery. We had a client whose Uncle had passed and he wanted to know where his grave was. We went to the e-plot add there was a navigation there just click on it with your phone and it'll guide you to the plot. After 20 years of being away and trying to find a site can be a miracle in it's own.

Setting Your ePlot up Online

We have made it very user friendly to go online and make your own -eplot (A one page website) that allows you to add:

1. Pictures
2. Life Stories- Tell your Story- however long it may be
3. E-Videos- Add a video you make via your phone or computer- Great for Military who are Deployed.
4. Legacy Video- We build it for you- you can send us up to 30 pictures- we will put them into a video with music and add it to your site. This is \$4.99 online.

5. E-CARDS- Allows your family and friends to have a personal message from you on a card. They swipe in on their phone or computer and your message will play- your e-Plot will pop up. It's really neat.

You can add as little or as much as you wish. Here are the directions to get started. If you need assistance perhaps a family member can help you- or call your agent. If you need help and can't figure it out- call us. We will work with you to help you as much as we can. Worst case scenario we'll have you send pictures to us and we'll ask you some questions on the phone and build your site for you.

Step 1 - Go to www.eplot.us

Step 2- Click on Client Free Membership - this allows you to be a member.

Step 3- Add the e-plot package you want via the E-PLOT link at the top- there is one that you create for \$14.99 and one we will build for you for \$24.99. Select which one is best for you. Your agent can collect your pictures and questionnaire and send them to us if you chose option 2. We will certainly send the pictures back to you.

Step 4- Once you are a member you can login in to your own site that will allow you to create a page of your own. It's kind of like Facebook- but a more personal site that gives you the freedom to design it in accordance to you- not someone else.

Step 5- After you add the text and pictures and videos- click SAVE and it will publish it for you- Simple.

You will have to have some knowledge of how to upload a video or link a URL to a video-- We encourage you to get in there and try it out- worst case - you mess up and we start over- there is a template there for you. Simple replace what is there with your information and it's that simple.

How Does This Benefit You?

3. The costs of funeral arrangements vary greatly, depending on the funeral home and on the type of service and merchandise you choose. For example, if the service you select involves viewing the remains, the funeral home may require embalming and preparation of the body, which can

be expensive. Also, there is a tremendous range in the price of caskets, depending on style, type of wood, lining, etc. The least expensive type of funeral service is direct burial or direct cremation. Being in the Final Expense department for over 10 years we have ran into many clients who didn't care to make plans for their family or to even care enough to have insurance. They left this burden on their families to bare. By you planning your funeral and setting up everything online you will save your family the following:

CHAPTER 2.

THE THINGS YOU'LL NEED THE DAY AFTER I AM GONE

Following the loss of a loved one you may find yourself overwhelmed with all the practical work that must be completed. This checklist is designed to assist you as you begin this work. Not all the items listed below will apply to you. Take each item, one at a time and eventually you will complete all the busy work that follows the loss of a loved one.

□ Death Certificates

You will need one copy for each insurance company, stocks, bonds, and mutual funds. You may also need a copy for the transfer of a vehicle, utility bills, cable bill, etc. The cost is

\$6.00 per copy. Keep extra copies of the Death Certificate to send with your income tax return if you file. Your funeral provider can assist you in ordering these.

▣ Social Security

If your loved one was receiving Social Security benefits the funeral provider will notify the Social Security Administration Office of your loved one's death. Social Security benefits include a one-time benefit of \$255 to the surviving spouse. If you are a surviving spouse, ask about your eligibility for increased benefits. Frequently, these matters can be handled by phone.

Dependent children may also be eligible for certain Social Security benefits

The Social Security Office (800) 772-1213 or contact online at www.socialsecurity.gov.

▣ Veteran's Administration and Form DD214

If your loved one was a veteran, you may be able to get assistance with the funeral services, burial plot, or other benefits. Your funeral provider can help you complete the Veteran's Administration claim forms. You will need a copy

of your loved one's discharge papers (DD214) and the specially designated certified copy of the Death Certificate marked for Veterans Administration Use Only.

☐ Railroad Retirement

If your loved one received Railroad Retirement contact the Railroad Retirement Board. You may need a certified copy of the Death Certificate for this.

☐ Company or Union

Contact all sources of employment or retirement funds that your loved one may have participated in for any benefits that are due. You may need a certified copy of the Death Certificate for this.

☐ Insurance Policies

Life Insurance:

Contact all life insurance companies with whom your loved one had policies. You will need to request a claim form. In order to complete the claim form, you will need to provide the policy number and a certified copy of the death

certificate. If requested, we will help you with the filing of your claim.

If your loved one was the beneficiary of an insurance policy, the owner should contact his or her insurance company and change the beneficiary. You may also want to review your own insurance needs.

If your loved one was working, contact the employer for information on pension plans, credit unions and union death benefits. You will need a certified copy of the death certificate for each claim.

Health Insurance:

Contact your health insurance company or employer regarding terminating coverage for your loved one while continuing coverage for others covered through the policy.

▣ Financial Matters

Seek the advice of an accountant or tax advisor about filing the deceased's tax return for the year of the death. Keep monthly bank statements on all individual and joint accounts that show the account balance on the day of death, since you will need this information for the estate tax return.

Arrange to change any joint bank accounts into your name. If the deceased's estate is in "trust," check with the Trust Department or Customer Service at the bank.

Arrange to change stocks and bonds into your name. Your bank or stockbroker will have the forms.

Return credit cards of the deceased with a certified copy of the death certificate, or notify the credit card company if you, as the survivor, want to retain use of the card

□ Miscellaneous Information

It is wise if you have a large estate to contact an estate attorney. If you use an attorney you will have to pay for their services, however, the help you receive may be invaluable.

Chapter 4.

HOW I WOULD LIKE THE FUNERAL TO BE ORCHESTRATED

It's very important for family members to agree about the type of services and merchandise to be purchased. Ideally, the family should designate one person to make the arrangements and to convey the family decisions to the funeral director. The customer will be responsible for the payment of the bill.

Set the Expectations of a Celebration of YOUR LIFE

The Baby Boomers see funerals as a Final Legacy and that means you've got to set the stage for them to celebrate life. Create an uplifting ambience for your families that will help them feel comfortable and happy and trust me, that makes all the difference. Here are a few ideas to get you started:

#1: Create a legacy table

One of the essentials of any personalized funeral service is a memory table. We love memory tables because you can do so much with them. You could even make multiple memory tables that are set-up like “stations” to represent different chapters or passions in the deceased person’s life. The possibilities truly are endless here, so encourage your families to use their imagination.

#2: Make a favorite quote board

A quick and easy way to add a special touch to a funeral service? Having families create their own quote board. Choose a quote that means something to the family or loved one and put it on a chalkboard, paper, or fabric. Then, add decorations of any kind and voila! You have a wonderful display for the service.

#3: Light candles in memory of the deceased

It’s a well known fact that you never forget a smell. And if your family can recall a certain smell that reminds them of their loved one (think grandma’s apple pie), suggest that the family light a few candles that add a healing aroma to the

service. If you want to take it to the next level, you could surprise your families and create luminaries for them to light in honor of the loved one. Heck, you could even have the family and funeral guests release them into the sky (as long as it's safe and legal, of course).

#4: Replace funeral homes decorations with the families'

Offer the opportunity for your family to swap out your viewing room's decorations for decorations of their choice to truly make the space their own. This will make the family feel more "at home" and comfortable, which is important at a time like this. Help them out by providing some empty picture frames, vases and candle holders, too.

#5: Display photos in a special way

Sure, a memory board is a great way to display the family's photos of their loved one, but why not help them think outside the box and create something that will make the service even more beautiful? Your families could tie photos to balloons create a wreath with them or hang them on clothespins to add some visual appeal to the service.

#6: Bring the indoors outdoors

If you're arranging an outdoor funeral service, make trees a centerpiece by hanging pictures, flowers or memory cards from them to add an unexpected personal touch. This is an especially great idea for gardeners or flower enthusiasts. Families could create little keepsakes for their guests like the mason jar below. They could put olive oil, a photo of the loved one and a flower to create the perfect keepsake for guests.

#7: Offer their favorite food and beverages

Instead of the standard coffee and water service at a funeral, why not surprise your families by offering the loved one's favorite drinks or snacks? Have a fruit punch or kool-aid made if they liked those types of drinks. One of our clients hired a Hog Roast and Bartender and went to town on some good ol barbecue and Jack and Cokes. We'll leave that up to you folks.

#8: Craft a colorful memory pillow

It might be hard for your families to go through their loved one's clothes after they're gone. But transforming them into a beautiful keepsake pillow will make it less daunting and more meaningful. It's a great way to go green and keep the loved one's memory alive.

#9: Put together a memory quilt

If a memory pillow doesn't spark their interest, why not suggest making a memory quilt, instead? They can be put together using the loved one's old t-shirts, clothes, favorite colors or patterns. You could take it even a step further and have the quilt customized to have the loved one's photos on it, too.

#10: Make a knick knack collage

Everyone has a few items that represent something significant in their life – whether it's an accomplishment, memory or passion. Why not put those items on display to make the service that much more personal? Create a simple collage that's visually appealing and make it your own – you

can add little cards to describe each item or create “stations” that encompass the different passions in the loved one’s life.

#11: Offer a memorial stone station

Set up a station with small stones and permanent markers. Then, create a sign that instructs every guest to write their names and a brief note on a rock to honor the loved one. The family can choose to keep the rocks in their home, garden, or to scatter them somewhere that’s meaningful to the deceased.

#12: Host an open mic event

Instead of the standard eulogy, open up the mic during the funeral service or afterwards during dinner and invite family and friends to share a few words about the loved one. This will allow them to publicly grieve and express their thoughts while also providing some insight and memories for others at the service.

#13: Play the loved one’s favorite game

Does the family have fond memories of sitting around the game table, playing Spades, Scrabble or Monopoly into the early hours of the morning with their loved one? Why not host an honorary game night in their honor? Games are a great way of bringing people together and reliving happy memories.

#14: Grow a Legacy tree

If you're looking for a way to engage funeral guests during the service, suggest a memory tree. Funeral guests can write down their favorite memory with the loved one and put it on a beautifully decorated tree that the family can take home with them. If you're interested in making one, here's a quick tutorial with some great examples.

#15: Hand out the loved one's favorite candy treats

I once attended a funeral for a friend of mine, word has it he liked this girl so much named Bonnie that he gave her his prizes from his Cracker Jacks the first night they met. So, at

his funeral, the funeral directors passed out small boxes of Cracker Jacks for everyone to take home in memory of him. I still have that box of Cracker Jacks to this day because it reminds me of the fond memories we had together.

#16: Give away customized E-CARDS

One of the easiest ways to make your families feel special is to offer complimentary bookmarks, prayer cards or thank you cards. We have E-CARDS (Forever Cards) in which we can put your information on, link to e-Plot, personalize a message to each family member or have them standard. Hand them out at the funeral and spread your last legacy to your friends and family. An online Legacy they can put on their keychain- Swipe their phone or computer and your message comes up in video or audio.

#17: Recite a poem or eulogy

When I was younger, I recited a poem at my grandfather's service and it was one of the most memorable part of the service. People asked me for weeks to send them a copy of them poem. If there will be kids present that like writing, have them put together a poem or short story and recite it

during the loved one's eulogy. Tears and laughter are sure to ensue.

When you are deployed the military has you do a deployment checklist. Medical records wills, power of attorneys, shots, equipment inspections, and the whole nine yards. We provide you with one more thing. Well, one concept that allows you to do things you couldn't before. Our goal is to allow you to tell your story through our online e-Plot's. Show off what you accomplished, play your favorite- music- and let others who pass your gravemarker know who you were in your home town.

You see, when I go out to my grandfather's grave and see his marker- I see his name, dates he lived, a message and his military rank. I can't see his face- I don't know his story, and I don't know what he did. I want to make sure we are never truly forgotten and the basis of this book and concept is for our military, heroes at home, and families who are proud of their heritage.

Instead of handing that letter off to your buddy before you go across the enemy lines (FEBA) Forward edge of the Battle Area, putting him in a bad spot because you didn't think ahead because of the 100 other things you had to do. Well, before you deploy or in your tent or quarters- we have made it possible for you to record a personal message to anyone in your family. Have one for you wife, your kids,

your mom and dad, and store them on your e-Plot. If you don't make it home- we'll let them know where to find your last message or you can by putting your e-Plot ID on the front page. If you make it back home - simply delete the video. We are looking for a live feed so you can talk with your spouse or kids as well. We will be coming to military bases around the CONUS- Continental USA- if you know of a troop or command deploying and would like us to come out and sign everyone up before they deploy just let us know. We'll have an agent come out in your area and help you out the best we can.

For those of you deploying we wish you a safe journey to your mission. We will pray for your return and watch over your family with his guiding love. Being separated is hard. I've been there. Make sure you leave in peace and no hostile feelings with your spouse, family or friends. Sometimes when we walk out the door with our gear in hand- that might be the last time we walk through that door. Say Goodbye, tell your family you love them. CHAPTER 7.

DEFINITIONS OF FUNERAL TERMS YOU SHOULD KNOW

Here is a list of commonly used terms associated with funerals and funeral homes.

Arrangement conference: the meeting between you and the funeral director during which you choose the services and merchandise you would like.

Basic arrangements fee: the charge made by the funeral home for making all the arrangements for final disposition of the body. It covers the availability of a funeral director, staff and equipment to respond to a death or inquiry. The fee also includes the arrangement conference and

securing necessary authorizations such as filing the death certificate and getting permits.

Burial: the most commonly chosen

final disposition. Costs associated with

burial include: grave opening and closing and maintenance of the grave site. You will also be charged by the funeral home for the purchase of a gravesite or plot , if you buy it through the home.

Cash advance item : items of service or merchandise for which the funeral home pays directly to a third party, such as fees for the cemetery or crematory, death certificates and clergy. The funeral home cannot profit on these items. Some funeral homes require you to pay for these items before the funeral service.

Casket price list: a printed or typewritten list which the funeral home presents to you before you discuss or are shown a casket.

Cemetery deed: the document from the cemetery which establishes your right to bury the deceased in the plot.

Columbarium: a type of vault with spaces for storing urns containing ashes or cremains.

Cremation: a process which reduces the body to ashes (cremains). The ashes may be buried, placed in a columbarium, or kept in your home. Some people choose to purchase an urn for the cremains rather than use the container provided by the crematory. There will be charges for the cremation and, if you choose, for an urn and space in a columbarium.

Customer's Designation of Intentions: a specific form that the funeral director will complete if you select cremation. It includes a space for "disposal of cremains" (what you will do with them). This fact, and the manner of disposition, must be clearly stated on the form. You must be given a copy of this form when arrangements are made.

Direct burial: the disposition of human remains by burial without a formal viewing, visitation, or ceremony, except for a graveside service.

Direct cremation: the disposition of human remains by cremation without a formal viewing, visitation, or ceremony.

Entombment: burial in an above-ground crypt in a mausoleum or in a lawn crypt. There will be a charge for the use of the crypt.

General Price List: a form which lists the price for all of the services and merchandise regularly offered by the funeral home. This form must be given to you to keep, at the beginning of the arrangement conference. You may request a copy from a funeral home when a personal visit is made. You do not need to complete funeral arrangements to receive this form.

Itemized Statement of Services and Merchandise: a detailed outline of the specific goods and services you have chosen, the price of each item, and a total cost. Also included will be an estimate of the cash advance fees to be paid on your behalf to third parties. The Itemized Statement will serve as your contract.

Outer interment receptacle: a container in the ground, in which the casket is placed. Commonly known as vaults and grave liners are some examples.

Outer Interment Receptacle Price List: this list will provide a brief description of each outer interment receptacle regularly offered by the funeral home. It must contain the retail price of each item offered.

Refrigeration fee: a fee charged by some funeral homes for cooling the body when embalming is not selected. If such a fee is charged, it must be stated up front, on both the General Price List and the Itemized Statement.

Topical disinfection: external cleansing of the body for which you will be charged. There cannot be an additional charge for this service when embalming is selected, since topical disinfection is part of the embalming process.

Transfer of remains fee: a fee for transportation of the body from the place where death occurred (or from the airport or morgue) to the funeral home.

CHAPTER 8.

SAVING ON FUNERALS AND CREMATIONS

At the end of the day our philosophy has always been this: Whatever money you can save on the funeral, is money to put in your loved ones hands. You made the right decision by your agent , out and meet with you or you ordered this book online, or we're on a base helping our soldiers who are deploying. We commend you on your decision to not leave this burden on your family.

We are not here to talk bad about funeral homes. Matter of fact the opposite. Funeral Homes have a great history in the towns they service. They see people they've known for 50 years come through the back doors and the widows coming through the front. They know some of you by your first names. They provide a service to you and your family that is respectable and honorable. So we would like to thank the

funeral homes and the funeral directors for all they provide for our community families. We would like to think that some of our services would help them help you one day.

We compare the process of a funeral with that of a wedding. You might be asking yourself, how the heck is that possible. Well, when you put that ring on - life is over for you. Especially us men out there. (I am teasing). We don't have a a lot of experience planning weddings. We don't own the dress company , or the cake company, the church the flower company, or the food providers and the honeymoon planners. I would reckon that if we had experience and used certain people a lot more we would get discounts. If I book the DJ every weekend- he's going to probably help me out or if I hand him a stack of clients who need his services.

Something with funeral homes. If you have experience in dealing with them and deal with them prior to the passing you can negotiate the prices a little better versus when mom is bawling and the kids are crying and the dogs are scratching the door to get in the funeral home. It's a sad day when we die. Not for us, for our family members. So do these things and help them ease that pain before the day comes that you die.

1. Fill the information out in this book or online at www.eplot.us so you have a plan in place.
2. Make sure you have an insurance policy or living trust. A trust the government cannot take when you are older and in the nursing home.
3. Let your family know if you want to be buried or burned. So they aren't guessing.
4. If you are having a funeral- pick out a casket before hand. Caskets come in different colors- metals, wood, and thickness. Who cares how thick the walls are. We're dead! Pick out a casket that serves your needs and not the needs of someone else. By you picking a casket out- online, at one funeral home, Sams Club, Costco's, you can than price shop this at the funeral homes in your area. See who can give you a fair deal plus the cost of shipping.
5. Make sure you look at the GPL(General Price Guide). Renting a casket for a cremation for \$750.00 is a lot when you can buy caskets for around the same price.
6. Sit your family down and talk to them. We understand kids don't want to talk about mom and dad dieing. However, when there 30-40 years old they are old enough to know they can help you plan things out- help you with a policy that is affordable to you, rather

than paying \$15,000 for a funeral these days. So if you don't do anything else today- visit us online if you haven't already picked out a final expense plan for you. We have companies that cover anyone over the phones- takes 15 minutes.

7. Stop putting this off. You're 50-60-70-80 years old. Tomorrow is not promised. It's a selfish act to leave the burden on your family.

You can protect your family and your legacy by just getting up and doing the things we know we should. We see so many clients say they don't care what happens, or my kids are going to take care of it, etc. You live once. You die once. In today's world everyone is struggling - so why leave the burden anyone when you can give them peace of mind today. If you made that decision and signed up for a plan we want to congratulate you for your decision.
